I apologize for any activities I may have left out, but whew it has been a busy time!

We certainly enjoy all of these projects and events; however, we often only experience them after most of the work has been done. Before things look beautiful and run so smoothly, there are many activities that go on "behind the scenes." Monetary prizes are available for those who earn a First Place. Clubs compete against other clubs of similar size.

Go to migangardenclubs.org. Click on Awards. There are many options listed. All the forms are there to use for the different types. Central Region awards are run separately. Their applications are due September 10, prizes are awarded at their fall conference. MGC and NGC General and Yearbook applications are due by October 1st and are presented in the spring.

Do you ever wonder where the water from a storm drain goes to?

Perhaps the water treatment facilities in your town. Sadly, what goes into a storm drain goes into our waterways. They drain into rivers and streams. Did you know that many Michigan residents live within a half mile of a storm drain?



With that knowledge of where the water goes, we can do some posi-

tive activities to keep our waterways from getting polluted by storm drain runoff. Many people use a storm drain as a way to get rid of unwanted liquids or lawn waste. The liquids such as pesticides, herbicides, and petroleum products can contain chemicals that do not break down and can cause harm in the stream where the drain water ends. Instead, there are county or township collection centers for hazardous waste.

Yard waste also can contribute to excess algae growth in streams and our lakes as they break down and add unneeded nutrients. Many of these are also treated with fertilizers and herbicides. It is much better to mulch lawn clipping back onto the lawn or compost them. If you do so, the recycled clippings can provide 50% of the nitrogen your lawn needs. Lawn waste contributes 20% of the material going into landfills. It is much better to take them to a site that collects them and turn them into mulch.
